# **COURSE DESCRIPTIONS\***

### WGS271Y: Gender, Race and Class in Contemporary Popular Culture

This course examines contemporary issues in popular culture, with a particular focus on gender, race, and class. Course materials and cultural sites will also pay special attention to questions of queerness, colonialism, neoliberalism, and the body. The course combines key concepts and theoretical frameworks in critical theory and cultural studies with analyses of media and popular culture sites.

### WGS334H: Intersections of Gender and Consumption

This course examines a number of approaches to the study of consumption and material culture. Through topics such as shopping, fashion, food, and drugs, we will explore themes such as value, division of labour, subject formation, desire, affect and social reproduction. There is an emphasis on anthropological investigations of consumption.

#### WGS335H: The Politics of Girlhood

This course communicates with the growing-field of 'girl studies' and provides a critical exploration of the historical, social, psychological and political definitions attached to 'girlhood'. We will move towards a feminist understanding of how definitions of the 'girl-child' shape individual experience, historical narratives, cultural representations, political agendas and futures.

## WGS372H: Women and Psychoanalysis

This course will begin by investigating foundational readings in psychoanalysis including classical theorists such as Freud, Reich and Klein, as well as more contemporary analytical theorists such as Kohut and Lacan. In addition, we will explore the various critiques of psychoanalysis that have been offered up by feminist and critical race scholars. We will also investigate the recent return to psychoanalysis in critical theory and look at how it has been taken up by various disciplines such as feminism, critical pedagogy, cultural and post colonial studies.

#### WGS373H: Gender and Violence

This course provides a feminist exploration of the historical, social, emotional and psychological impacts of violence. We will quarry spaces and ideas not always defined as violent, but which nonetheless sustain violent relations. Analysis of the fantasies, representations and ideologies that structure hegemonic masculinity, racism, and homophobia will be important to our thinking. Emphasis will be placed on artistic responses to violence, and creative attempts to work-through trauma and suffering which results from the violence of living in phobic cultures.
