The Women and Gender Studies Institute seeks up to 1 Teaching Assistant for the following course:

WGS397H1F – Politics of Girlhood

The course communicates the growing field of "girl studies" and provides a critical exploration of the historical, social, psychological and political definitions attached to girlhood. We will move toward a feminist understanding of how definitions of girl-child shape individual experience, historical narratives, cultural representations, political agendas and futures.

Qualifications

An academic background in Women and Gender Studies at the graduate level is preferred.

Relevant Criterion

Previous experience is the more relevant criterion than the need to acquire experience in respect of this posted position.

- Holding tutorial or study group sessions, if applicable

Duties of this position shall be performed at the campus on which the position is located.
